


Would you like to read the full-text of the policy before you answer the survey questions?




Yes, I would like to read the full text of the proposed policy.	185	43%

Tobacco-Free Campus Survey - Questions


In principle, do you believe that the University of Delaware should have a tobacco-free campus?




Do you support the Tobacco-Free Campus Policy as it is currently written?




Would you support a Tobacco-Free Campus Policy that does not prohibit e-cigarettes?

26 Commented in favor of the policy (as written)

12 Skeptical about the success of the policy (in general)

- 42 Skepticism/lack of support expressed by a non-smoker
- 17 Smoking is not an issue on campus/"this is a solution in search of a problem"
- 12 Unrealistic expectations/this policy is not the best way to achieve the goal
- 8 The policy will not stop smokers from smoking on campus
- 7 Second-hand smoke is insignificant compared to air pollution from e.g. power plant on STAR campus, motor vehicles

33 Concerned about how the policy will be implemented or enforced (generally)

- 11 The policy is unenforceable
- 10 Enforce the current policy regarding not smoking near building entrances before enacting a new policy
- 3 Student buy-in is needed
- 2 There are more rampant problems with the undergraduate student body than smoking that should be addressed first, e.g. cheating, drinking, parties

Suggestions & concerns regarding implementation

- 33 Designated smoking areas are preferable, and should be away from buildings and high-traffic areas
- 28 E-cigarettes should not be prohibited/they are used as a smoking cessation aid
- 24 Concerned about waste from cigarette butts if ash trays are removed
- 12 Emphasize/enhance smoking cessation programs/education efforts
- 9 Chewing tobacco should not be prohibited
- 3 There should be clear maps produced/posted which show precisely where smoking is prohibited/area which is not "on-campus" where it is permitted
- 2 Designated smoking areas will be ineffective
- 1 "Signage will need to be multilingual"

Suggestions & concerns regarding enforcement

- 7 Concerns about delineation between university-owned and public property/concerns about groups smoking on sidewalks adjacent to campus
- 5 Use of police resources to enforce the policy is "misguided", "wasteful", "dangerous"
- 3 Fines for smoking look like a "cash grab" by the university
- 1 Judicial sanctions are a form of discrimination against smokers

31 UD does not have the right to dictate people's actions/restrict personal freedom

- 17 It is unfair to punish those who are addicted/"an incredibly harsh punishment for people who are unfortunately addicted"
- 10 Recommendation (usually tongue in cheek) to regulate or prohibit other unhealthful things, e.g. sweets, bacon, caffeine, soda, alcohol, concealed firearms, "poor sleeping habits", "sedentary lifestyles"
- 8 Smoking should be allowed in personal property, e.g. cars, apartments
- 5 Disproportionately affects international students who come from a culture where tobacco use is more acceptable than in the US
- 5 "Draconian"
- 4 Graduate studies are stressful enough that students should be allowed to smoke to help relieve the stress
- 2 Disproportionately affects university staff
- 1 "Delaware dares to be first in taking away our freedom :("
