




What are microaggressions?

Everyday verbal, nonverbal, and environmental **slights**, **snubs**, **or** insults, whether intentional or *unintentional*, which communicate hostile, derogatory, or negative **messages** to target persons based solely upon their marginalized group membership.

What are microaggressions?

Examples:

- Using sexist language ("What do you guys think?")
- Mispronunciation of names
- Disregarding pronouns
- Disregarding religious or cultural traditions and holidays
- Singling out students because of their background
- Setting low expectations for students from particular groups



What are microaggressions?



Microassault

Intentional attack, avoidance, or discrimination



Microinsult

Demeaning communication



Microinvalidation

Ignoring or negating someone's lived experience



- "You're all middle-class students, your parents can afford this textbook for you."
 - Microinvalidation
- Only calling on male students
 - Microinsult
- When an international student asks you a question after class and you continue to pack your bag...but you give full attention when an American student asks you a question
 - Microassault
- "You speak so well!"
 - Microinsult



What are the effects of microaggressions?

- Effects are cumulative:
 - Microaggression mosquito
- Effects are consequential:
 - Colin in Black and White (Netflix)
 - Episode 3: Road Trip





What are the effects of microaggressions?

- Effects on individuals
 - Isolation
 - Stereotype threat

"Death by a thousand cuts"

- Effects on learning environment
 - Additional pressures in STEM fields
 - Less welcoming environments; increased attrition
- Effects on the profession
 - Increased attrition = less diversity in faculty
