
meaningful collaboration and cooperation.

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# CAPACITY BUILDING

### > INTRODUCING THE PPE FELLOWS

PPE Fellows are supported for up to one year with funds to support either partnership or capacity building projects and will have the opportunity to participate, contribute to, and lead PPE initiatives in the future.

Amy Ricketts, staff member in the Professional Development Center for Educators (PDCE), is developing a partnership with John Bassett Moore Intermediate School in Smyrna, focused on professional learning around science inquiry.





**Elizabeth Soslau**, faculty member in the School of Education, is developing a partnership with Need in Deed and Warner Elementary School focused on professional development and implementation of student service learning.

### **COLLABORATIVE CONVERSATION**

PPE welcomed Bill Penuel and Katie Van Horne from the University of Colorado Boulder for a conversation on research-practice partnerships in education. The event featured collaborative learning and networking opportunities for 30 UD faculty, staff, doctoral students, and community partners.

## LEADING EFFORTS

### > TEACHDE

Delaware faces a challenge to ensure a high-quality, diverse K–12 workforce that meets the needs of



its schools and students. The TeachDE advisory council, launched in 2017, is a coalition of teachers, local education agency leaders, representatives from institutions of higher education and teacher preparation programs, and other community stakeholders charged with developing recommendations to strengthen the Delaware teacher pipeline. The recommendations address the following four challenges:

- 1. Teacher supply
- 2. Content-area shortages
- 3. Teacher attrition
- 4. Diversity and equity literacy

### > A FOCUS ON EQUITY

This year Christina School District's Shue-Medill Middle School chose to focus their professional learning on equity. PPE convened UD's Elizabeth Soslau, Jill Ewing Flynn, Roderick Carey, Chanelle Wilson-Poe, Hillary Mead, and Erin Baugher to work with Shue-Medill's Principal Michele Savage and her teacher leader Casey Montigney.

The team designed and implemented professional learning community sessions that addressed issues of equity in the classroom as they related to identity, diversity, and equity literacy. Going forward, PPE will continue to build capacity for equity oriented professional learning and program development at Shue-Medill and other Delaware schools.

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# PARTNERSHIPS SPOTLIGHTS

### **> STUDENT ENGAGEMENT**

Students in the Blue Hen Leadership Program, led by Director Susan Luchey, partner with United Way of Delaware, Newark High School, Connecting Generations, Fouryouth Productions, Autism Delaware, American Association of University Women (AAUW), Boys and Girls Club of Newark, Kingswood Community Center, Goodwill of Delaware and Delaware County, YWCA, and UrbanPromise Wilmington, Planting Hope, among others to design and implement community engaged projects that focus on nonprofit management, social entrepreneurship, and leadership.

### > POLICY AND ADVOCACY

University of Delaware's Provost Robin Morgan, in partnership with the provosts of Delaware's other higher education institutions, is actively engaged in rebuilding the P–20 Council's leadership role in the alignment of all levels of Delaware's education system. This P–20 partnership will set clear policy priorities focused on collaboration and alignment. One such priority is to reduce the need for remediation for Delaware high school students transitioning to post-secondary education and training. Associate Dean John Pelesko in the College of Arts and Sciences is leading the P–20 mathematics remediation committee as they identify and later implement policy and practice recommendations.



### > RESEARCH

Through a grant from the Institute of Education Sciences (IES), Joshua Wilson (pictured above) and Charles MacArthur, faculty in the School of Education, and Gaysha Beard, supervisor of English Language Arts at Red Clay Consolidated School District, are working in partnership to study the effect of existing automated essay-scoring systems software on the writing of 2,880 students in grades three through five in the district.

### > PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

For the past three years, the University of Delaware's Professional Development Center for Educators (PDCE) and Delaware Academy for School Leadership (DASL) have partnered with the Laurel School District to improve leadership, curriculum, teacher knowledge and practice, and school culture. Through professional development and coaching, the district, PDCE, and DASL have prioritized deep understanding of standards and assessment, and evidence-based practices in literacy, mathematics, Next Generation Science, and social studies.
