There is no doubt regarding the identity of the wife of Spencer Clay Gunn, since her name Sarah A. Jenks is prominently shown on their gravestone in Plattsburgh NY in Figure 1.

There are many posted family trees that identify the parents of Sarah Ann Jenks as Obadiah and Cleora (Worden) Jenks. However, no actual documented historical evidence has been found to give any factual support for that claim. The purpose of this study is to gather together a large amount of circumstantial evidence that has been found that supports the statement that Obadiah and Cleora (Worden) Jenks were the parents of the Sarah Ann Jenks who married Spencer Clay Gunn.

The apparent link between Spencer and Sarah started with some connection that existed between their grandparents' families in Shaftsbury, Vermont, and we will look at these families in turn.

Spencer Gunn's Parents and Grandparents

The ancestors of Spencer Clay Gunn are known from *The Children of Aaron D and Philinda Stratton Gunn*. Spencer's parents were Aaron D. Gunn and Philinda Stratton. Both parents were born in Bennington/Shaftsbury, VT and they were married in Shaftsbury on 13 December 1813. Their son Spencer was born in Vermont on 25 March 1816. The couple had three other sons: Jefferson, Cornelius and Cyrenius who were all born in New York State. Aaron's father was

Moses Gunn, and Figure 2 shows the blue highlighted entry for the Moses Gunn Family in the 1790 Federal Census in Shaftsbury, VT.

The Federal Census entry for Moses Gunn indicates that the household contained four males under the age of 16, and one of these boys would have been Aaron D. Gunn who was born in July of 1790.

Judah Worden and his Daughter Cleora

The name Judah Worden appears on the same page of the 1790 Federal Census for Shaftsbury, VT as the Moses Gunn entry, and it is highlighted in yellow in Figure 2. That indicates that there were three females in the Worden household, and one of them was daughter Cleora Worden who was born 11 January 1783. The appearance of the Moses Gunn and Judah Worden Family entries on this same page for the Federal Census indicates that they lived in rather close proximity near Shaftsbury, VT to suggest that the family members probably knew each other.

The *Worden Genealogy* (1868) in Figure 3 indicates that Judah Worden was the son of Peter Worden of New Providence, RI who was a Baptist minister with ties to Shaftsbury and to central New York State. Moreover, Judah had a brother Rufus who is also listed in the 1790 Federal Census Record in Figure 2 (shaded orange) with Judah and Moses Gunn. This genealogy also states that Judah was Deacon of the Shaftsbury Baptist Church in 1800.

Eld. P. Warden, of New Providence, reporting that 60 had been baptized there—that he baptized 29 in Shaftsbury in one day—and the work was spreading. In 1795, he aided in forming old "Otsego"—the pioneer Baptist Association in Central New York.

In 1865, James Redway, of Amber, a nonagenarian member of my father's former church in Marcellus, remembered, when a boy, of seeing "the old Elder." He was indeed a dignified man, discoursing, in a chair, with a cane in his hand, upon the evidences of adoption. "I know," said he, "that I am born of God, just as I know that I hold this staff in my hand—because I FEEL it."

Eld J.B. Lyons, who in his youth looked upon old Eld. Worden as a superior being, says he was a large and portly man, his eyes blue, his hair somewhat sandy, his complexion fresh, his voice strong and rather harsh, but his deportment mild, affable, and instructive.

He was buried in a yard in the East parish of Cheshire, and an inscribed stone erected to his memory.

From the Warwick town records it seems that Peter Worden of Coventry bought of J. Wightman, Warwick, 1750. In 1756, Peter and Mercy Worden, of Warwick, sold lands to J. Ladd, in Wechatacourt, for £700.

HIS POSTERITY.

In 1753 was b Esther—and in 1754, b Lucinda—daughters of Peter and Mercy Worden, of Warwick. They had two or three other daughters, and four sons. A grandson—Peter Worden Dean, who was ordained a Deacon of Manchester Baptist church in 1827, and is now an Associate Judge of Windham Co., Vt.—gives me some information respecting the family. From him I learn that the four sons were Judah, Deacon of a Shaftsbury Bapt. Ch. in 1800—Richmond—Peter, 6th, who lived with the Elder—and Rufus. Peter, 6th, had four sons—Peter, 7th, lived near Auburn, N.Y.—Leland, died in Adams (north of Cheshire) and left a number of children, one a merchant at Waukeegan, Ill.—Alden, died in Illinois, and has a son there—and Elmer, who emigrated and was lost sight of.

Of the daughters of Eld. P. W., two m brothers of the name of Mattison: one lived in Hoosiek, had no children; the other lived in Shaftsbury and had four children. AnoAnother *Warden (Worden) Genealogy* (1901) in Figure 4 gives further details about Judah Worden. This genealogy indicates that Judah Worden left Shaftsbury and moved to New York State. The fact that this is the same Judah Worden from the 1868 *Worden Genealogy* follows from the fact that it says Judah was born in Rhode Island and that his oldest son Allen was born in Shaftsbury, VT in 1781.

This is an obvious misprint for Cleora Worden, since the will of Judah Worden, dated 26 November 1817, in Nunda, Allegany County, NY lists his surviving children from the 1901 biography, including his daughter "Cleora Worden Jenks" on page 126.




Figure 5C. Judah Worden Will 26 November 1817, Nunda, Allegany, NY, page 128.




Figure 6. Marriage record for Cleora Worden and Obadiah Jenks.

There is no doubt as to who Judah's daughter Cleora Worden married, since marriage records from Shaftsbury, VT in Figure 6 indicate that Cleora "Wordin" married Obadiah Jenks there on 21 February 1802.

This has been a long effort to show three facts. First, Aaron D. Gunn, a son of Moses Gunn, married Philinda Stratton in Shaftsbury on 13 December 1813. Second, Cleora Worden, a daughter of Judah Worden, married Obadiah Jenks in Shaftsbury on 21 February 1802. Third, the listing of fathers' names in the 1790 Federal Census records for Shaftsbury indicate that Moses Gunn and Judah Worden lived fairly close together. It is very likely that some connection existed between these two families. Moreover, the 1920 letter that was written by Aaron D. Gunn* states that his grandfather Aaron D. Gunn travelled west from Vermont to New York State "with a family called Jinks or Jenks".

Another important fact that follows from this information is that Cleora Jenks was born in the vicinity of Shaftsbury, VT on 11 January 1783. This follows from the facts that her brother Allen was born in Shaftsbury in 1781 from the 1901 *Worden Genealogy* (Figure 4), that her father Judah was Deacon of the Baptist Church there in 1800 from the 1868 *Worden Genealogy* (Figure 3), and that she was married to Obadiah Jenks there on 21 February 1802 from the Shaftsbury marriage records (Figure 6).

An undated *Jenks Genealogy* in Figure 7 gives a brief biography of Obadiah Jenks, stating that he was born in Providence, RI in 1778, that he died 12 June 1837, and that he married Cleora Worden in Shaftsbury, VT on 21 February 1802, and that she died 9 August 1854. This leaves no doubt that this is the particular Obadiah Jenks that we are interested in. This short biography lists three children for Obadiah and Cleora, and while these names are correct, this list will be found to be very incomplete. Two of the children's names (Eunice and Almira) on this list will however be critical later in our study.

He married, at Martinsburg, Lewis Co., N. Y., Fanny Cronk, daughter of James and Nancy Coates and widow of John Cronk, born at Martinsburg in 1822 and died at Forestport, N. Y. in 1874.

Zachariah appears in the 1825 census of the town of Leyden with two females in his family. In 1851 he bought land in Leyden from the heirs of John Schuyler (Revolutionary bounty land) and in 1853 he conveyed this land to Margaret Jenks and she sold it in 1856. He served in the War of 1812 in the company of Capt. E. Strong, Connecticut militia. His two sons were born in what is now the town of Osceola but which was then part of Leyden, Lewis Co., N. Y.




Figure 8. Federal Census entry in 1880 for Sarah Ann Gunn in Saranac, Clinton, NY, pg. 8.

The first clue that the Sarah Ann Jenks who married Spencer Clay Gunn was a daughter of Obadiah and Cleora Worden Jenks comes from the 1880 Federal Census entry for Sarah A Gunn in Saranac, Clinton County, NY. We know from *The Children of Aaron D and Philinda Stratton Gunn* that Sarah and Spencer had a daughter named Amelia who married Hugh Muholland, and Sarah was shown as living with them in 1880, as shown in Figure 8.

The 1880 Federal census asked for the birthplace of individuals and their parents. Sarah Gunn who is identified as "Mother" responded that she was born in "NY", her father was born in "RI", and that her mother was born in "Vt". As a result, the Sarah Ann Jenks who married Spencer C. Gunn reported that her parents were born in locations that perfectly coincide with the proper birthplaces for Obadiah Jenks and Cleora Worden to be her parents. Moreover, Rhode Island and Vermont were rather uncommon responses for individuals who were being registered in Saranac, NY in 1880, so it would be very unlikely for this response simply to be due to coincidence. Additional evidence will be developed as we progress to support this possibility regarding Sarah Ann Jenk's parentage.

The next step is to find evidence that places Spencer C. Gunn and Sarah Ann Jenks, and their parents, at the same location when Spencer and Sarah were married. Figure 9 shows the 1850 Federal Census entry for the Spencer C. Gunn Family in Girard Township, Erie County PA. The couple's oldest child Eunice Gunn is listed at age 12. For greater precision regarding her birth year, a copy of Eunice Gunn Cornell's death certificate is shown in Figure 10. This death certificate correctly names her parents and says that she was born in Beaver Township, PA on 30 May 1838, which is consistent with the Federal Census entry in 1850. It seems reasonable to conclude that Spencer and Sarah were married in 1836 or 1837, but no record of their marriage has been located anywhere. It is however possible to show that both of them, and their parents, were in Darien/Pembroke, Genesee County, NY until around 1837.

Obadiah Jenks Arrives in Darien/Pembroke, NY in 1815




Figure 11A. Genesee County Gazetteer (1890).

Obadiah Jenks is referenced in *Genesee County Gazetteer* (1890) in Figure 11, stating that he arrived in "what is now Pembroke and Darien" as an early settler in 1815. Little distinction is made between these two adjoining towns in Genesee County.


Saxton Bailey came to Darien in 1806, with his son Joshua, and bought 600 acres of land where Charles C. Magry now lives. His family came in 1808. His son Daniel came in 1808, and served as a captain in the War of 1812. He was a Presbyterian, and built the church at the Center. Joshua Bailey was also an early settler. He was a farmer of much industry and accumulated a great deal of property. He sold his farm and started a school at the Center.

Benjamin C. Adams was a very early store-keeper at Darien City, and had the business all to himself for a number of years, or until about 1832.

Dexter Bordwell, son of John and Mary (Edson) Bordwell, of Orange County, Vt., was born March 24, 1801. With his father he came to Darien in 1810, residing with him until 22 years of age. The labors of clearing the farm were so great that all were obliged to assist. The first school-house, of logs, Mr. Bordwell assisted in erecting. At this school he was educated, and proved himself a master of the spelling book. He purchased, in 1825, the farm where his only son, Aaron Bordwell, now lives, and borrowed \$1 to pay for making out the contract. He married Tirzah, daughter of Sullivan and Lucy Russ, in 1829, and by close economy, industry, and perseverance succeeded in paying for his place. He was an "old line Whig" and a staunch supporter of the Republican party. He died in 1885, and his wife in 1873. Their only daughter, an amiable



A search of the Federal Census records shows this entry is for the only Obadiah Jenks in all of Genesee County, NY in 1820. In addition, this represents the only Jenks Family entry in Darien/Pembroke in 1820. So, if this is indeed the Obadiah Jenks of interest, Obadiah and Cleora Worden Jenks had many more children than the three that were listed in the *Jenks Genealogy* in Figure 7. Since the Sarah Ann Jenks who married Spencer C. Gunn was born 19 January 1819, she would match perfectly with this family group as one of the three females being under the age of 10 in 1820.

The Obadiah Jenks family also appears in Pembroke in the 1830 Federal Census, and that entry is shown in Figure 13. Just as in 1820 this entry is for the only Obadiah Jenks in all of Genesee County, NY in 1830. Norman Jenks is the second Jenks Federal Census entry in Pembroke in 1830, and this family resides directly next to the Obadiah Jenks entry in the Federal Census in Figure 13. Being registered at age 20-30 with one son, Norman is a probable son of Obadiah and Cleora. Sarah Jenks was age 11 in 1830, so she could not possibly be a daughter of Norman Jenks. However, she is a probable match for one of the two females aged 10 through 15 in the Obadiah Jenks household in 1830 Federal Census in Figure 13.

It remains for us to show that these 1820 and 1830 Federal Census entries correspond with the Obadiah Jenks that we have been tracking, and there are three sources to prove this fact. The first evidence comes from *Early Settlers of New York State* (1993) that contains tombstone inscriptions and cemetery information for Maple Hill Cemetery in North Darien, NY in Figure 14. The entries for Lot 69 that was owned by Obadiah Jenks indicates that the Obadiah Jenks who is buried there died on 12 January 1837 at age 60, which explains why there was no entry for him in the 1840 Federal Census. This gives a date of birth in about 1777 and adds that he was born in Providence RI, to correspond with the information in the *Jenks Genealogy* in Figure 7. The statement that he had lived in Darien for 23 years gives an arrival there about 1814, after spending some time in Brutus, NY, so this is definitely the same Obadiah Jenks that appears in the *Genesee County Gazetteer* (1890) in Figure 11, and in the 1820 and 1830 Federal Census records in Figures 12 and 13 respectively.

The records of the Maple Hill Cemetery in North Darien, NY in Figure 14 show that Obadiah's wife Cleora Jenks is buried next to him, stating that she died 9 August 1854 at age 74, that she arrived in Darien 39 years earlier after spending time in Brutus, NY with Obadiah, and that she was born in Manchester, VT (which is only 14 miles from Shaftsbury).




Figure 15. Gravestone of Almira Jenks in Maple Hill Cemetery.

Daughter Almira Jenks is buried with her parents. She died 31 May 1826 at age 12 after being born in Brutus, NY and then living in Darien for 11 years. This information about Obadiah, Cleora and Almira Jenks corresponds perfectly with the information that is given in the *Jenks Genealogy* in Figure 7. A photograph of Almira Jenks gravestone in Maple Hill Cemetery is shown in Figure 15, and it is inscribed on that stone that she was a "daughter of Obadiah and Cleora Jenks". Her death in 1826 explains an absent young daughter in the family between the 1820 and 1830 Federal Census records in Figures 12 and 13.

The *Jenks Genealogy* in Figure 7 stated that Obadiah and Cleora's daughter Eunice Jenks married Lorenzo Carter, and this fact is verified on page 111 of a *Carter Genealogy* (1909) in Figure 16. Moreover, the 1850 Federal Census entry in Figure 17 shows that Lorenzo and Eunice Jenks Carter were living in Darien, Genesee County, NY with their family. Cleora Jenks is also listed as another resident of that Carter Family household, at age 67 and reporting that she was born in "Vt".

All of this information leads to the obvious conclusion that the Obadiah and Cleora Worden Jenks that were being tracked earlier did in fact settle in Darien/Pembroke, NY in 1815, where Obadiah died in 1837 and Cleora died in 1854. They also obviously had many more children than the three that were recorded in the undated *Jenks Genealogy* in Figure 7.



To summarize to this point, we know that Obadiah Jenks was born in Providence, RI, that he married Cleora Worden in Shaftsbury, VT in 1802, and Cleora was born near Shaftsbury, The couple moved to central New York State and then relocated to Darien/Pembroke, Genesee County, NY in 1815. They remained there until Obadiah died in 1837. The Sarah Ann Jenks who married Spencer C, Gunn at about age 18 in about 1837 when Obadiah died was born in New York, and she reported in 1850 that her father was born in RI and that her mother was born in VT, which points her parentage directly toward being Obadiah and Cleora. The associated Worden and Gunn Families also probably had some connection in Vermont.

If evidence exists to place Spencer C. Gunn in Darien/Pembroke, NY in 1837 when he was married, there is very substantial circumstantial evidence that the Sarah Ann Jenks that he married was indeed the daughter of Obadiah and Cleora Worden Jenks, since no other feasible Jenks parents resided in the area in that time-frame based on Federal Census records.

Aaron D. Gunn Arrives in Darien/Pembroke, NY in 1817

Brothers Aaron and Daniel Gunn jointly purchased land from Holland Land Company on 24 June 1817 from records from Western NY Land Transactions (1996) in Figure 18. The codes for Lot 36 that they purchased indicate that it was located in Darien, Genesee County, NY. Their families were living as neighbors in the 1820 Federal Census in Figure 19. Aaron and Philinda Gunn are shown as residing in Pembroke with two boys less than 10 (Spencer and Jefferson). As before, there is no real distinction being made between the towns of Darien and Pembroke.

Both brothers Aaron and Daniel Gunn were still residing in Pembroke in the 1830 Federal Census, but they were no longer neighbors, as seen in Figure 20 with the entry for Aaron Gunn. Two additional sons have been aded to Aaron's family since 1820 (Cyrenius and Cornelius). One, or both, of Aaron and Daniel Gunn must have relocated between 1820 and 1830.





Spencer Gunn was born 25 March 1816 from Figure 1, so he was 14 years old and obviously living with the Aaron Gunn Family in Darien/Pembroke in 1830. It is clear that this is the Aaron Gunn of interest from a biography of his son Jefferson in a *History of Erie County* (1884) in Figure 21. This states that Jefferson, a brother of Spencer, was born in Darien, but the stated year of birth as 1844 is a typographical error, since it correctly states that his father Aaron died in 1834. Jefferson Gunn was born 27 January 1819 according to his tombstone.

Parents Almon and Hannah (Baker) Eldred, both born in Otsago county, and came to Frie county in 1824 and she in born in Otsego county, and came to Erie county in 1821, he died 1842, and she in 1877, children two-H. B., and D. W. Eldred, Mrs. Eldred was the daughter of Edward and Martha Bilyard, of Onondaga county, came to Erie county in 1825.

Eshleman Jacob, p o Clarence Centre, farmer, born in Pennsylvania, in 1818, settled in Erie county in 1826, was supervisor eight years; wife, Catherine Rhodes,

born in Pennsylvania in 1813, married in 1837, children ten-five living.

Eshelman John, p o Clarence Centre, general store, born in Pennsylvania in 1826, has held the office of postmaster; wife, Anna H. Hershey, of Pennsylvania, married in 1850, and died in 1862; second wife Catherine M. Dessing, born in Pennsylvania, in 1825, married in 1863, children three.

Eshleman Levi F., p o Clarence Centre, farmer, two hundred and forty acres, born at Clarence, in 1841; wife, Mary Lewis, born in Ontario county in 1835, married in 1864, children four—Ada J., Edwin L., Alice C., and Mary E.

Fisher Henry, p o Clarence Centre, farmer, eighty-five acres, born in Germany in 1838, came to county in 1853; wife Charlotte Castle, born in Clarence in 1844, married in 1867; children two-Libbie and Fred.

Frick Henry, p o Harris Hill.

Gallup George, p o Clarence Hollow, general farmer, born in Clarence in 1820; wife Louisa M. Boyer, born in Newstead in 1819, married in 1842; one adopted daughter-Ellen M. Parents Asa and Laura (Pond) Gallup, who came to Erie county in 1820; he died in 1881, aged eighty eight; she died in 1834; children seven. Mrs. Gallup was the daughter of John and Olive (Smith) Boyer; they were early set-

tlers and died in Erie county

Gunn Jefferson S., p o Harris Hill, general farmer, born in Darien, Genesee county, in 1844, was a teacher twelve years; wife Emeline Rearick, born in Alden in 1825, married in 1848, and died March 23, 1876; second wife Caroline Zimmer, daughter of Gideon and Catharine Zimmer, of Franklin county, Pa., born in Ohio in 1829, married in 1877. Parents Aaron D., and Philinda (Stratton) Gunn, of Genesee county; the former was one of the early settlers of Erie county, and died in 1834, aged forty-seven; the latter died in 1848, aged forty-three; children four—Spencer C., Jefferson S., Cyrenius C., Cornelius C. Cyrenius was a graduate of the Albany State Normal School in 1846; he died of consumption at the age of twenty-four. The teachers of Erie county caused a monument to be raised to his memory, at Lancaster, Erie county.

Hershey Elizabeth, p o Clarence, farmer, 72 acres, born in Canada in 1813, came to Erie county in 1816; husband Jones Hershey, born in Canada in 1809, married in 1832, and died May 13, 1882; children two.

Hunt G. B., p o East Clarence, farmer, 700 acres, born in Rensselaer county in 1819, came to Erie county in 1825; wife Eliza Parker, born in Rensselaer county in 1821, married in 1845; children four-Margaret, Caroline, Warren and Ellen.

Aaron Gunn and Philinda Stratton were married in Shaftsbury, VT on 13 December 1813 and Eunice Gunn Cornell's death certificate in Figure 10 states that her father Spencer was born in Vermont. As a result, Aaron Gunn would have relocated to Darien/Pembroke from Vermont very soon after Spencer's birth. A number of sources say that Spencer was born in Vermont, a number say that he was born in New York, and a few say he was born in New Hampshire. Whichever location of birth is true, Aaron and Philinda moved to Darien/Pembroke within a very few years of their marriage in Shaftsbury.




Figure 22A. Some 1834 Probate Records for Aaron D. Gunn.

Jefferson Gunn's biography in Figure 21 also makes reference to Erie County, NY with regard to his parents. At some point after Aaron Gunn was residing in Darien/Pembroke for the Federal Census in 1830 (Figure 20), he relocated to Alden, Erie County, NY. Aaron D. Gunn then died intestate in Alden "on or about" 3 December 1833 and a court surrogate was appointed for the estate, according to 1834 Probate Records that were filed on 28 June 1834 in Figure 22. These probate records were filed in the county seat of Buffalo, NY, but the important point is that Aaron D, Gunn died in Alden, NY. While Alden is in Erie County and Darien is in Genesee County, these two towns are right next to each other. The dividing line between Alden and Darien is the dividing line between Erie County and Genesee County. So, after Aaron D. Gunn and his family moved to Alden, they essentially were still the in Darien/Pembroke vicinity in 1833.

These 1834 Probate Records show some very interesting facts. First, Aaron's wife Philinda had already married Uriah Newberry by June of 1834, when she renounced all duties to act as an administrator to deal with the deceased Aaron Gunn's property. Aaron's brothers Daniel and Hiram were both residents of Darien and they signed-off on the agreement for the establishment of a surrogate to deal with the property of their deceased brother who died in Alden. This presumably resulted either from the fact that Aaron and Daniel had jointly purchased property in Darien in 1817, or from the fact that they lived nearby and were uncles to their brother Aaron's four minor sons.

The next item of interest in the 1834 Probate records consists in a partial list of notes for people concerning debts that were associated with Aaron Gunn's estate in 1834. One of these notes for \$20.00 involved Aaron's brother Daniel, who was living in Darien. Another one for \$23.00 involved Samuel P. Jenks. So, the family of Aaron Gunn was associated with the Jenks Family while they lived in the Darien/Pembroke area. It is not known with certainty, but Samuel P. Jenks was most likely a son of Obadiah Jenks and therefore a brother of Sarah Ann Jenks. This relationship will be considered in more detail later.




Figure 23A. Some 1837 Probate Records for Aaron D. Gunn.

In 1834 Spencer was 18 years old with three younger brothers, so they were all minors. Nothing is known with certainty about what happened to them, or where they lived, until 1837. But, Aaron Gunn's estate was not actually settled until 1837, and documents from that settlement are shown in Figure 23. On 27 March 1837, just two days after Spencer C. Gunn turned age 21 to no longer be a minor, his brothers petitioned the surrogate of their father's estate to make Spencer their guardian "for the purpose of selling property that they owned". On 28 March 1837 Spencer asked to be made the guardian of his three minor brothers, noting that no guardian had ever been appointed for them, and this request was approved.




Figure 23B. Some 1837 Probate Records for Aaron D. Gunn.

Once the guardianship request was approved, the property that the brothers inherited was sold very quickly, since the 1837 probate records show a statement from James Newberry dated 10 July 1837. This indicates that he had received \$29.05 as Philinda's share of the settlement of Aaron D. Gunn's estate. It states that Philinda and her husband Uriah Newbury had both died before that time, and that he was accepting the payment as the executor of their estates

The statement that the four sons were not appointed any guardian in the time between Aaron and Philinda death and 1837 is quite odd. It seems likely that the four sons simply remained on Aaron's farm from the time of his death in December 1833 (when Spencer was close to age 18) until the guardianship petition papers were signed and the property was sold immediately after

Spencer turned age 21 in 1837. In any event, Spencer C. Gunn was still in the vicinity of Darien/Pembroke to make the sworn statement to the surrogate on 28 March 1837 in Figure 23.

The year 1837 was pivotal in the lives of Spencer C. Gunn and Sarah Ann Jenks. Spencer's father Aaron died in 1833 and Spencer turned age 21 in 1837 to be able to sell his father's property and obtain his share of the inheritance in that same year. Sarah turned age 18 in 1837 when her father died. Spencer C. Gunn and Sarah Ann Jenks were both in the vicinity of Darien/Pembroke at that time, which provides significant circumstantial evidence, along with the previous evidence, to support the fact that they married at that place about 1837 and left the area to go to Pennsylvania soon after that.




Figure 24. Federal Census 1840 entry for Spencer C. Gunn.

Eunice Gunn was the first child born to Spencer and Sarah, and her death certificate in Figure 10 states that she was born on 30 May 1838 in Beaver Township, PA to indicate that Spencer and Sarah left the Darien/Pembroke area for Pennsylvania very soon after they were married.. The 1840 Federal Census entry for Spencer Gunn in Figure 24 indicates that his family was residing in Beaver Township, Crawford County, PA at that time, to distinguish which particular Beaver Township in Pennsylvania that Eunice Gunn was born in.

By the time that the 1840 Census was taken in Figure 24, Spencer and Sarah's second daughter Amelia had been born. Amelia shows up in the 1850 Federal Census at age 10 in Figure 9. Spencer and Sarah had moved again before 1850, since the 1850 Federal Census in Figure 9 shows them residing in Girard Township, Erie County, PA.




Figure 25A. Federal Census Entry in 1850 for Jefferson Gunn in Clarence, NY Page 177A.

There is no evidence regarding the whereabouts of the three remaining Gunn brothers in 1840. It is noted that Spencer Gunn's brother Jefferson would have been of age 21 in 1840, and there is evidence that he took on responsibility for their two younger brothers. Jefferson's biography in Figure 21 notes that brother Cyrenius died in 1846, after graduating from Albany State Normal School, and a later catalog from that school notes that fact and gives Jefferson Gunn as a contact. Brother Cornelius is found to be staying with Jefferson Gunn in the 1850 Census in Clarence, Erie County, NY in Figure 25, with name "C. C.". The Aaron Gunn residing with Jefferson in the 1850 Federal Census entry was actually his nephew, a son of Spencer C. Gunn.

More About Samuel P. Jenks

The 1834 Probate Records for Aaron Gunn in Figure 22 notes the existence of a debt between Aaron Gunn and Samuel P. Jenks, to show some connection between the Gunn and Jenks Families in Darien/Pembroke, NY. Additional information is available to give a clue to determine exactly who this Samuel P. Jenks was. A *Phelps Genealogy* (1885) gives a biography of Samuel P Jenks in Figure 26. Samuel was married in Alexander, New York on 10 April 1834, and Alexander, NY is located in Genesee County very close to Darien/Pembroke. Samuel's first child Samuel Levant Jenks was born in Darien. Given the typical age at marriage at that time, Samuel P. Jenks was probably born about 1813. As seen before in the case of Sarah Ann Jenks, there was only one option available for determining the parents of Samuel P. Jenks in the Darien/Pembroke vicinity at that time, and the Federal Census records for Obadiah Jenks in 1820 in Figure 12 and in 1830 in Figure 13 clearly conform with the notion that Samuel P. Jenks was Obadiah's son, and therefore Sarah Ann's brother.

It also definitely appears that Spencer C. Gunn's Family and Samuel P. Jenk's Family departed from Darien/Pembroke about 1837 and went to Beaver Township, Crawford County. PA together, since Spencer and Sarah had a daughter there in 1838 and the *Phelps Genealogy* (1885) states that Samuel and Pamelia Jenks had a daughter there in 1840. This supports the possibility that the couples were connected by Sarah Ann Jenks and Samuel P. Jenks being siblings. Samuel P. Jenks and his family then moved from Beaver Township, PA to Wisconsin before 1850 and Spencer and Sarah moved to Girard Township, Erie County, PA in the same timeframe.

Conclusion

No hard evidence has been found that specifically states who the parents were of the Sarah Ann Jenks who married Spencer Clay Gunn. All of the related evidence compiled here does however appear to adequately prove beyond a reasonable doubt that her parents were Obadiah Jenks who was born in Providence, RI and Cleora Worden who was born in Shaftsbury, VT.


