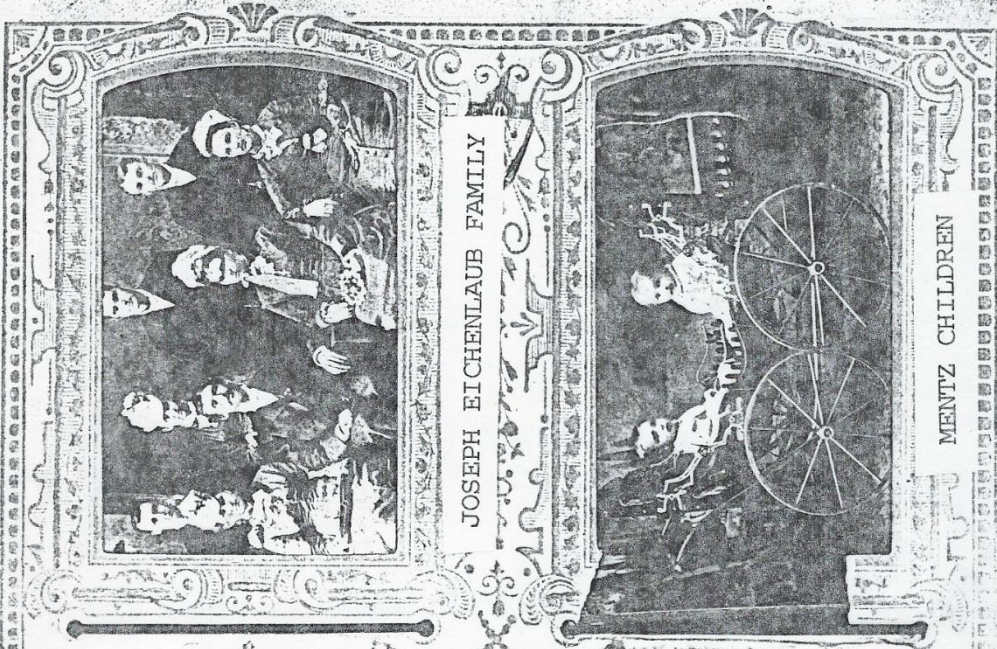

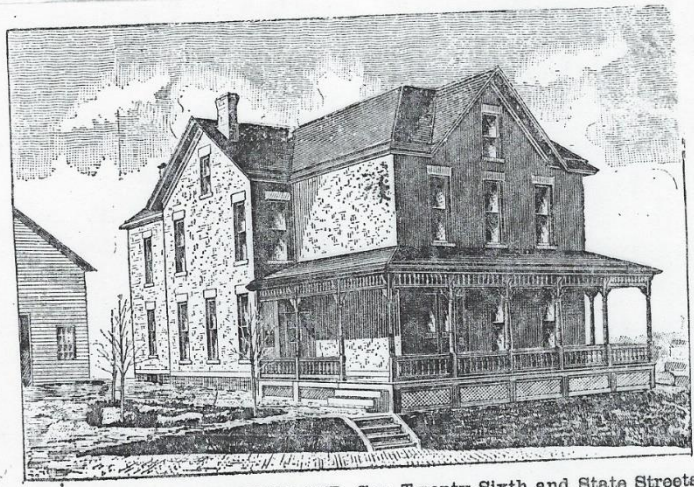

E. Eichenlaub Dies Suddenly

Edward J. Eichenlaub, prominent life insurance man, of this city, and prominently known throughout this section, died this morning at his residence, 223 East 8th street, aged 55 years.

Although Mr. Eichenlaub had been ill confined to his home for several weeks past, few knew of his serious illness, and the announcement of his death came as a surprise to many. His geniality drew to him in close friendship ties all with whom he came in contact, and there are few men in this city better liked than was Edward J. Eichenlaub.

When Mr. Eichenlaub first embarked in the insurance business he was connected with the Prudential, where he continued but a short time, when he wrote with the New York Life, and later the John Hancock, and recently also the Travelers' insurance, winning for himself marks of distinction in high records seldom paralleled by other insurance writers throughout the country. Of late he was authorized by the government in changing over service men's insurance policies.

He is survived by his wife, Anna M. Winter Eichenlaub, his two sons, George E., well-known architect, and Raymond Eichenlaub, and his two brothers, Rev. Candidus Eichenlaub, O. S. B., professor at St. Vincent's college, Beatty, Pa., who was summoned to his bedside, several days ago, and Rev. Leo Eichenlaub, O. S. B., Long Mont, Colorado, and five sisters, Mrs. William M. Gannon, of Erie; Mrs. Dr. John Hierholzer, of Pittsburg, Pa.; Mrs. John Sigrist, of Brooklyn, N. Y.; Sister Raphael, O. S. B., of St. Mary's Pa.; Sister Euphrasia, O. S. F., Pittsburg, Pa., and one grandchild, Janet Marie Eichenlaub.

Mr. Eichenlaub was a life-long member of St. Mary's church where funeral services will be held at a time to be announced.

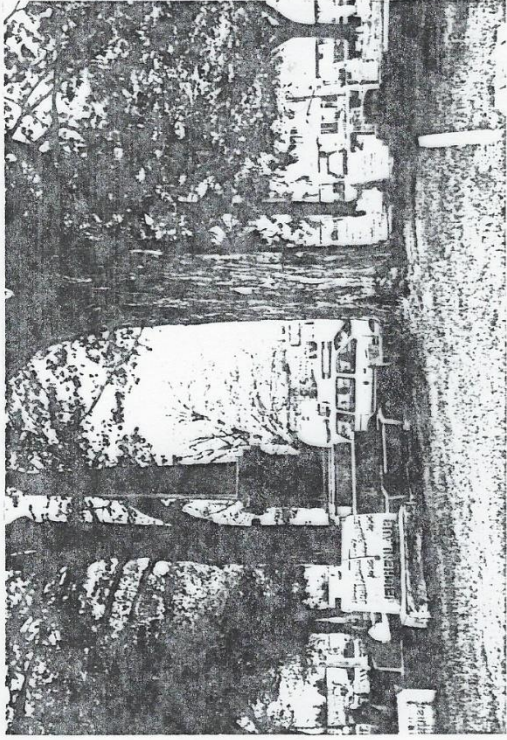

here, Mr. Eichenlaub took up the study of law in the offices of the late Attorney, H. J. Curtze. He put in four years there and then was admitted to practice.

He was associated with various law offices at different times, built up a lucrative practice in real estate and estates. At the beginning he had a few criminal cases but didn't like that type of work. He constantly became a specialist in realty work and the orphans' court.

For years he handled a large amount of the quieter types of law business in Erie and only in recent years has been taking things easy even though he daily leaves his home at 308 W. 19th st. and goes to his office in the Security-Peoples' bank building.

Many Erieites know Mr. Eichenlaub as the man who saunters along the business district, slowly twirling a cane and whistling a snappy tune to himself. Once in a while he'd stop before a group of children, do a little clog or juggle a rubber ball.

And that little paragraph sums up Mr. Eichenlaub's philosophy of life.

Never in his life has he been known to lose his temper. He's always been the peace-loving type with an unkind word for no one. An optimist, he has spent an entire life looking for the silver lining. When things went wrong, he laughed.

Life Just Fat and Lean

"You get a streak of fat and then a streak of lean. That's the way life has always been." And the world would probably be a better place to live in if everyone had that attitude toward life.

Though he's lost some of the snap he possessed until four years ago when he was seriously injured in an auto accident, Mr. Eichenlaub goes out daily, sometimes for walks, almost always to his office and the court house.

It was only a few years ago he gave up riding a bicycle—an old wooden-spoked bicycle which he daily rode to and fro from the office. He thought nothing of wheeling it all the way to Fairview, near Fairview, and back. The bike, incidentally, was probably the last wooden-spoked affair ridden here. He still has it.

"I think I could still ride it," he said today and executed a few clog steps.

That almost-daily clogging, whistling when things looked darkest and his even disposition account for his longevity, he said. "Everything," he added, "happens for the best."

COUNTY TO ADD MACHINES TO VOTING BOOTH

Cane-Twirling Erie Lawyer, 82, Still Active in His Profession

Idle Voting Machines Will Be Used In Erie and County to Set Record

Use of the unusual in this year's primary of September 12, evinced by the rise in registration commissioners decided to use 233 voting machines in the 143 precincts of Erie city and it was stated Wednesday by Ralph Benedict, chief of the county commis-

Benedict also said that Grover Benedict, chief custodian of voting machines in Erie county is now at the manufacturer's plant in Jamestown, N. Y., getting the 31 machines rented, in proper condition for the primary on September 12. The voting machines will be delivered to Erie some time next week, Benedict pointed out.

There will be at least one voting machine in each voting precinct, Benedict said. "In some precincts we will use two machines and it will probably be necessary to place three machines in some of the voting booths where the number of voters is large," he said.

Few men in the city are better known than he is and even fewer can boast of the gentility which has been his throughout his career.

Still Is Carefree

Eighty-two now, Mr. Eichenlaub is still the happy and carefree individual he has been to the thousands who know him personally and remember him and his daily jaunts to and from his law offices.

Now nearing the eighty-three mark, Mr. Eichenlaub is believed to be the second oldest attorney in Erie county, both in age and years of service.

But the years have treated him kindly. His vision and hearing are good and his memory still is keen enough to recall his early days in the local courts and the fun he had as an amateur entertainer.

In all his years at the bar, and there are few attorneys in the country who can boast of the same thing, he has never handled a divorce case.

Won't Handle Divorces

He made up his mind when he first became an attorney that if he had to depend on divorces, he'd starve first. And he never broke that promise to himself, even though the fees he could have earned added to a tidy little sum.

"I never believed in divorces," he said. "I think when a couple marries, they should stay married."

That's his only explanation.

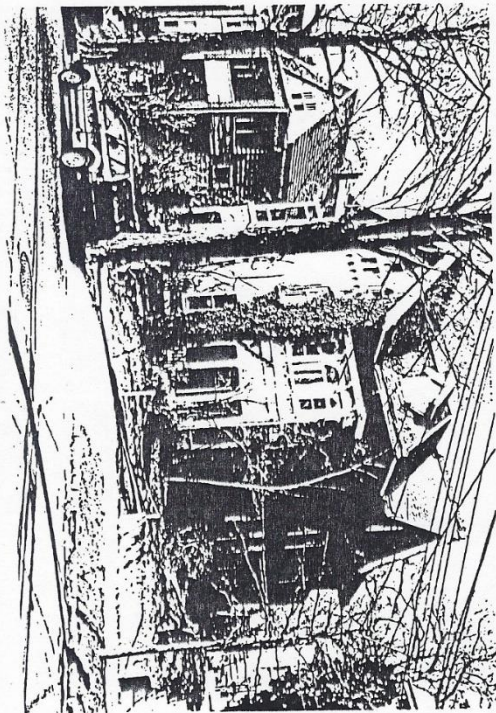
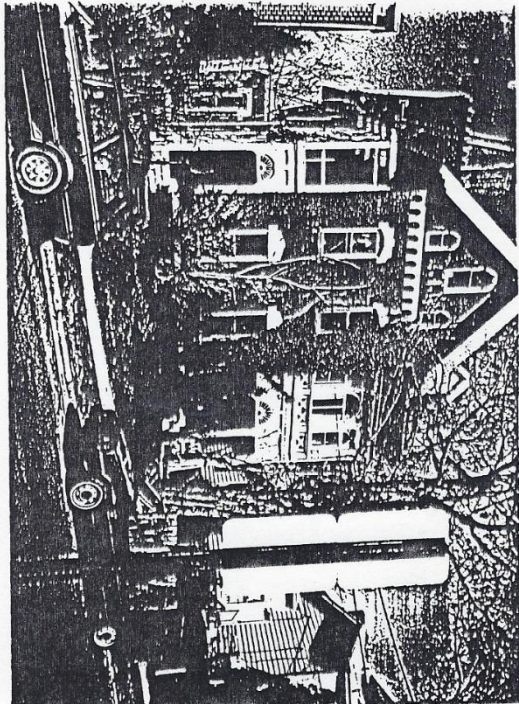

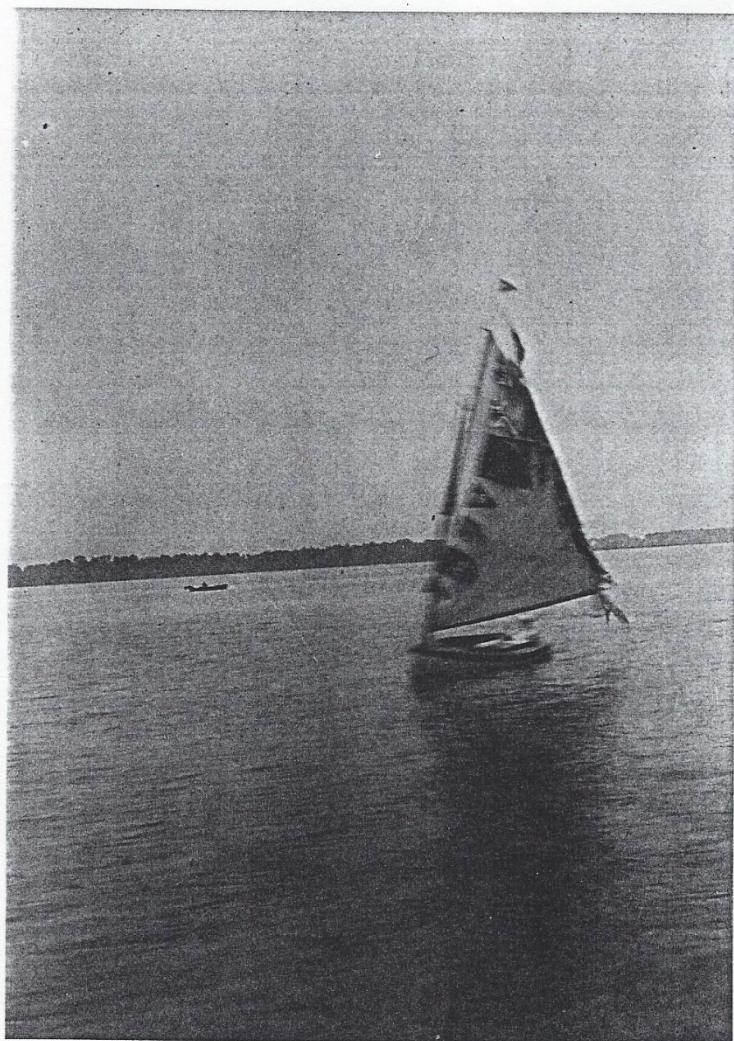

Dated 16th DEC 1874 - Recorded 3d DEC 1878 GEE

I, JOSEPH EICHENLAUB, of Erie, Erie Co., Penna., being of sound mind, memory and understanding; do make publish and declare this to be my last will and testament, hereby revoking and making void all former wills by me heretofore made. - - - - -

I dispose of the property of which I may be possessed at the time of my death in manner following, to wit; - - - - -

- 1st I direct that all of my just debts and funeral expenses be first paid out of my estate by my executors. - - - - -
- 2nd I give devise and bequeath to my beloved wife Margaret Eichenlaub for and during her natural life, all of my interest and income arising from my property real, personal and mixed, excepting as herein stated, subject to the payment of all taxes and assessments which may become chargeable on any of my said property and also subject to the expenses of keeping said property in repair. - - -
- 3d I give and bequeath to my son George F Eichenlaub the sum of twenty-five dollars to be paid to him or his heirs one year after the death of my said wife. - - - - -
- 4th I give and bequeath to my son FERDINAND EICHENLAUB the sum of twenty-five dollars to be paid to him or his heirs one year after the death of my said wife. * * * * *
- 5th After all of my just debts have been paid, and after all of the funeral expenses both of myself and my wife have been paid and also after the death of my said wife, my Executors are hereby requested and empowered to sell at public or at private sale, all of my property excepting Lots Nos 41 & 42 in the Eichenlaub Addition and proper bills of sales or deeds therefor to make and my executors are hereby authorized to sell my real estate on such terms as in their opinion will be for the best interest of my estate and to take such bonds and mortgages from the purchasers to secure the payments as may be agreed upon by my executors and purchasers-----
- 6th My Executors are hereby directed to sell all of my estate property, excepting as stated within one year after the death of my said wife, but in case I should survive her, then within one year after my death. - - - - -
- 7th The Lots known as Nos 41 & 42 in the Eichenlaub Addition in Erie on which is a frame house, occupied by my daughter Elizabeth and her family, I direct to be valued and appraised at the sum of fourteen hundred and eighty dollars,. And I hereby give devise and bequeath said house and lots to my beloved daughter Elizabeth, wife of Philip Schindwein and her heirs forever. In consideration whereof she must continue to work for and devote herself to her mother as heretofore. - - - - -
- 8th After all of my property as stated has been sold, my executors are directed to add the proceeds of it, the money left by me, or which has been collected from debt due me, the amt's due me or my estate from J C DURNER, A MENTZ, my two sons-in-laws. J A EICHENLAUB and Joseph Eichenlaub Jr on notes which I hold against each of them for money borrowed from me, and the value of said lots 41 & 42 to wit; \$1,480.00 together. Then they are directed to divide said gross sum, less the legacies to my two sons George F. and Ferdinand Eichenlaub, my debts, said funeral expenses and the costs and charges of settling my estate, into six equal parts - One sixth of said gross amount shall belong to my son Joseph Eichenlaub Jr and his heirs forever. But out of his shall (share) shall first be taken the balance that may be due to me, at the time of my death, of his note held by me dated May 6 1874 for \$2,899.00 and the balance shall be made up to him in money and
